WHICH CAME FIRST, THE CHICKEN OR THE EGG?



his must be the most important question in human history! This rather rudimentary question has sparked debate among nerds for God knows how

long. I believe I know the answer. I know the chicken came first, and here is why:


Firstly, it is important to consider what the question is really asking. 'What came first' implies that the presence of an egg either existed without a chicken laying it, or that a chicken came into existence without being born from a chicken egg. It seems like there is nowhere to go from here, after all it just comes down to how you define the egg. But I disagree because I believe there is only one correct solution. You see, the eggshell does not contain DNA. The egg is simply a casing to protect the foster inside. As the preceding species to the chicken

laid the egg that would become the first chicken in existence, the egg had no indicator or relation to what was inside. The egg belongs to its layer, which is in this case the species before the chicken. Furthermore, the egg must have been fertilized. Before fertilization, the foster had the exact same DNA as the mother, making it not chicken. Only after the crossing of the two preceding chicken species was the first chicken created. The egg remained unchanged by fertilization, meaning its ownership remains with the mother's design and function, not a chicken egg, although it now inhabits the first chicken ever. This is also demonstrated in artificial breeding in labs. We can take a chicken egg, cross fertilize with some other species to get a new hybrid species, although the egg remains a chicken egg.

My personal favorites have been "Infest The Rats Nest" (2019, trash metal), "PetroDragonic Apocalypse; or, Dawn of Eternal Night: An Annihilation of Planet Earth and the Beginning of Merciless Damnation" (2023, Heavy/progressive metal), "Polygondwanaland" (2017, Progressive rock), "Quarters!" (2014, Psychedelic Pop/Jazz rock), and "Paper Mâché Dream Balloon". They're on tour in Europe right now and have already played multiple new songs, so it seems like they're continuing the trend of making a frankly concerning amount of music into 2024 as well. I shan't complain.

Honorable Mention Time waster: TOOL (Progressive/Alternative Metal)

American metal band that I on average listened to for 2.27 hours per day in 2023. They've only ever released five studio albums. All of them are 10/10's. They do a lot of weird stuff with polyrythms and time signatures but I'm not going to pretend I know enough about music theory to actually understand any of it so all I can really say is that it makes the music sound weird in the best way possible. 






Stafett for Livet is a major fund and awareness raising event for those directly or indirectly affected by cancer. The Stafett lasts for 24 hours, and it symbolises that Cancer never takes a break and those affected have to deal with it 24/7. The Stafett takes place in Badeparken and it consist of multiple teams which can represent a school, business or another voluntary organisation. Each team needs at least one person on the track at all times. However, you do not need to run as you can choose the pace you want (You can even roll if you have a wheelchair).

I have for over two years played an active role in the Stafett and I first started in working there in 2022. For 2023, my goal was to engage the whole IB department more in the Stafett as we could both benefit from getting CAS, while also contributing to a good cause. There were two things that I wanted us to achieve. The first was to get more students to participate in the organisation of the event. 
So, to whoever is reading this; love. Love once you get the chance, because at the end, it's worth every second.



important influence being music.














THE DAYS ARE GETTING CLOSER

THE KEY(S) TO SUCCESS





[PS. I am still Indian; I still love rice; I still have an Indian accent; and, I still use my brain to do math.]




TO SLEEP OR NOT TO SLEEP

Amnesty is an organisation which originally was established to support prisoners of conscience, but now over 60 years later, it is a non-governmental organisation working for human rights. During my time in Amnesty, I have learned a lot about the work Amnesty has done and is doing now. One of the cases that really sticks out to me is Narges Mohammadi, who is fighting for women's rights in Iran. At the moment, she is in prison for her activism, and Amnesty International and Amnesty Norway is continuing to support her work by sending letters to

the government demanding that she be let out as well as sending letters to her to show our support! Our group has actually sent Narges many letters through Amnesty's campaign "Write for rights".

I have learned a lot about Amnesty's work over their 60 years, this last year. I have gotten the opportunity to go to Oslo twice to participate in national meetings. In February 2024, Ingeborg, the deputy leader, and I were part of a leader gathering, where we learned a lot about being leaders of a group as well as how to engage in creative activism. In April 2024, Ingeborg, William, Emma, Maria and I got to be part of the national meeting, where we got to see how decisions are made within the organisation as well as learning even more about Amnesty and what they do.

I believe the Mobile Phone Hotels are pointless.

After the winter-break our Principal, along with the School Council, implemented these 'Bob the Builder' looking boxes to limit phone usage during classes. The Principal had several arguments for why the mobile hotels should be implemented. However, I believe that they are somewhat weak and I would like to dismantle the rationale that was made.

 CLAIM 1: "Safety for students so they don't get filmed or have their picture taken while presenting in class."

Heard of Teams? And.... one can log into Snapchat, Messenger, Instagram and so on, on their computer. Also, the students that spread those messages are already not in class, so they have their phone on them, undermining the mobile hotels.

SCLAIM 4: "National recommendations suggest limiting phone usage during school."

It 's OK that there is a national recommendation to limit phone usage during school, however, just like the Principal's arguments, a mobile hotel won't fix the problem. To conclude, I have one final reason for why this policy is unwise. These 'Bob the Builder'- boxes cost around 300kr each, and there are ca 200 of them at SVGS. That's 60 000kr! And let's not forget Harald's message about the vandalism on the boxes. So, let's say that they had to replace 20 boxes, then the cost is 66 000kr!! Personally, I think that the money should have been spent on something else, like a better cafeteria menu.

I believe [ToK!] that the (costly?) introduction of MPH's came about because we (all of us: students, teachers, and administrators) recognise a deep problem: we have become addicted (physiologically and socially) not to mobile phones as material objects, but to digital media: to the distraction or elsewhere-ness that they have created. I think we all know this.

I think we also acknowledge the myth of multi-tasking, created and propagated by the tech-industry in the late 1990's and early 2000's, has firmly been debunked; meaning that we know that to do anything well, we must concentrate: we must focus on the task at hand... otherwise much is done, but little is done well. It's odd that at a time when we are encouraged by techmarketers to 'live in the moment', we are also sold devices which ensure that this is never possible.

But what has this got to do with the MPH's ???' Well, we must understand that the MPH is the recognition of a problem and they force us to recognise that we are

addicted...
and as with
all addictions, we
must first recognise
the addiction in order to
try to overcome it. Asking 16-,
17-, and 18-year-olds to 'put away
their phones' is a humiliating act for
all of us: it contaminates our relationships
and infantilises us. But these are infantilising,
narcissistic technologies, and we must try to do
something. The MPH's are this some-thing.

Over the past few months, I have been giving serious thought to digital media, propaganda promoting digital literacy and the so-called democratisation of knowledge and have concluded there is a huge con: a trick is being played, the consequences of which will not impact those who are persuading us that, 'to know something' now means to be able to look-it-up on the internet. It's taken me to my age (44) to realise that the consequences of a significant event takes around 30-years to see their true impact. With the introduction of the smart(!)-phone in 2007, I think we are only starting to see the consequences: the consequences for our democracies; for our sense-of-self; and, for what it means to know something. Our lives are being game-ified, with clear winners and losers and I am becoming increasingly convinced that with the digitisation of our existence we all think something is being lost. The MPH's may be the tiny first step (if not the best step) in helping us recognise that we have a problem and that we need to find a solution. Maybe that is the point of the MPH: to get us to think. We want to believe that we shape technology. However, we are resistant to the idea that technology (and the designers of digital technology) shapes us, creating winners and never losers.


















NOELIA: EL NUEVO MIKE TYSON?


orway is home to many very cool and totally awesome rocks. I think most Norwegians would say, if asked, that their favourite rock species is Larvikitt. And why not? It

I guess I could say you should love Tønsbergitt for the same reason you should love Tønsberg, because the fact that it's found in the coolest city in the world does sort of make it the coolest rock in the world too.

WHAT I LEARNT FROM ORWELL



iterary works can deepen our understanding of the world around us.


The novel *Nineteen Eighty-Four* by George Orwell made me think about the real dangers of surveillance and the power of language in a way I had not before. I recognised that the themes originally written about in 1948 and published in 1949 discussing totalitarianism, censorship, propaganda, and technology are still relevant in our day-to-day lives in 2024. The warnings of the dangers of a totalitarian state as the only form of government seems to me to not be that out of reach. The significance of Orwell's 75-year-old novel and warning against letting our democratic forms of government and our rights be taken

away have never lost its relevance, especially when looking at current trends. *Nineteen Eighty-Four* follows Winston Smith, who works at "The Ministry of Truth" which ironically alters the past to preserve the power of the party and the strength of the seemingly omniscient figure "Big Brother." Winston is under constant surveillance through the party's use of telescreens and by other party members. There are several lessons and observations I think we still can learn from Orwell's novel.

A lesson *Nineteen Eighty-Four* teaches me is that ignorance is not strength. The infamous ironic quote of the party claiming that "ignorance is strength" (Orwell, 1949, p.109) allows Big Brother



to reign supreme and destroy records of the past to control the future due to the ignorance of the people. For the party members there is something "dangerous" about their own free thinking due to the constant propaganda they are fed. The slogan further strengthens the foundation of Oceania and how mind control is obtained by making society ignorant where the strong position of authority is maintained due to this ignorance. The same can be found in today's society. However, Orwell seems to criticise the apathy of the party members and due to the constant bombardment of propaganda and the use of fear, the reader gets an understanding of why the subjects of the party follow the government decrees although they are highly illogical. He highlights how the



people's ignorance is exactly what can give rise to an oppressive regime. Today we are often told not to question mass media, legal institutions, the authorities or even schoolbooks and if we question these things we are often corrected or set aside in society. Therefore, there is a strength in ignorance as it makes us able to stay under the radar and be a part of the masses. However, in the big picture, this quote can explain how important it is to participate in public affairs so that we stay critical and can make better decisions regarding those around us. The more information we have in the form of values, facts, and perspectives, the more understanding we can become. Furthermore, Newspeak can be compared to fake news and spreading false information.
This reminds us of the dangers of altering the truth and controlling information.
Thus, I believe that ignorance

is not strength, as questioning why we do the things we do as well as participating in what we care about—is important in every community to maintain a space where everyone can feel represented, and to avoid echo chambers where no ideas are questioned. Additionally, *Nineteen Eighty-Four* can remind us to be wary of altered information.

Further, the influence of technology in Nineteen Eighty-Four might have predicted the influence of technology today. As we all know, privacy is essential for free society. The use of telescreens spying on individuals in Nineteen Eighty-Four is much like websites getting access to unauthorised material or increased government surveillance today. The more technology develops, the more information we seem to share about ourselves. With the rise of technology comes many possibilities, something Orwell seemed to recognise. It can be used for development and connection, but also for control and surveillance. This leads us to ask the questions: is surveillance becoming normalised in our society and is this something we should be concerned about in our daily lives? Our google devices, are they, perhaps, our telescreens? The information that is gathered can cause an atmosphere of fear and paranoia as the use of mass surveillance which is data accessed without people's knowledge or consent is increasing. From Orwell I think we can learn that we must not let technology take such a major role in every part of our lives and that



we should be wary about what we share about ourselves online. Of course, social media is a way for us to stay informed and build relationships but without sufficient guidelines protecting our footprints online, our privacy will eventually be breached.


Finally, I think Nineteen Eighty-Four taught me that we can look further at other dystopian novels becoming our reality. Orwell described a social and political climate with a government that takes control over its citizens. Although it might be argued that no regimes are as oppressive today, dystopian writing often contains grains of truth. Orwell writes in a style that is immersive and realistic as he explores the social and psychological effects of living in a suppressive society. When I read *Nineteen Eighty-Four*, I was also reading The Handmaid's Tale, a book in which all events are based on real ones. Like Orwell's political climate, which is inspired by that of London in 1948, Atwood based her novel on events in human history such as the Salem witch-trials, the Lebensborn programme and the slave trade. Hence, I think Nineteen Eighty-Four and books such as The Handmaids Tale can teach us that something needs to be done for us to not establish totalitarianism or repeat the mistakes of those before us. For us to see the changes we want in history, we must stand up for what we believe in, and our rights, and to combat the changes or events we do not agree with. Through these pieces of literature, we as readers can get a greater understanding of the worst possible scenarios threatening our freedoms. Through the protagonist Winston, we can see that there is hope even in the grimmest of times and that we should appreciate the freedoms we often take for granted. Although Winston is broken by the party in the end, he reminds us that we as individuals can stand up against oppression for a better future for ourselves and others. Two plus two will only become five if we let

it happen.

Therefore, I think we should heed Orwell's warnings and learn from the people of Oceania's mistakes. We must do everything in our right to defend our democracy and the laws protecting us. Authors like Atwood and Orwell are warning us about the dire futures that might come, warnings that we might not want to hear. This is why I find them highly relevant for us to learn from today. We must not be ignorant and must stay critical, we must protect our privacy with the rise of technology, and we cannot let history repeat itself to the point where there is no way back from oppression and totalitarianism. In the end, as Julia would say "They can't get inside you" (Orwell,1949, p.297), therefore, I think it is important that whatever comes from inside of us is working towards the welfare of others no matter what meets us in the time to come.

What is something you will not miss as an IB Co-ordinator/Department Head?


The workload connected to a leader's role can sometimes be

still remember 8 years ago, when Iceland became the smallest country to ever qualify for EURO in 2016. I remember watching the first game against Portugal who later went on

to win the whole tournament. Iceland played defense throughout the game but were able to score one goal in that game which ended 1-1. Ronaldo was interviewed after the game where he said "Iceland celebrated like they won the whole tournament" which was how much it meant for us to draw against such a huge country in comparison to Iceland.

The next game was against Hungary and we somehow managed to draw again. The last game in the group stage was against Austria and we had to win to get out of the group stage. I remember watching the final minutes when the score was 1-1 and at the 94th minute, Iceland had one last counter attack and scored with the last kick of the game and miraculously qualified despite being ranked as the worst team to ever play in the tournament. I remember the pride I felt from my national team. When I saw we were drawn against England, one of the tournament's favorites, I remember how I lost all hope. As expected, England scored in the 4th minute after receiving a penalty, but despite all odds Iceland equalized only 2 minutes later and even went on to score to make it 2-1 in the 18th minute.

Despite Iceland leading, I had no hope for us winning after the full 90 minutes but surprisingly we did. Iceland, the worst national team to ever play in the tournament knocked out England, one of, if not, the best national teams. After that game I felt as anything was possible, but then we were drawn against France, I remember seeing the manager and players of the Icelandic national team getting too cocky and changing their tactics. They stopped playing defence and played like Iceland were the favorites to win. We lost the game 5-2 and got knocked out. After the tournament Iceland went from 149th to 23rd on the official FIFA rankings. Sometimes, I still think of these times and all the memories which I will cherish for the rest of my life.

Anyways, just stream the album.










SELF EXPRESSION



ECHOES OF JUSTICE



aftermath of World War II, one of the most controversial debates revolves around

the blaming of Adolf Hitler in the formation of the Holocaust. Only through such a broad and balanced approach can we learn from the past to ensure that such horror never recur in the future.

Lead prosecutor Kveberg Kreken gave clear evidence for why Hitler should be pled guilty by using Hitler's book Mein Kampf. "What Hitler has done is barbaric and I'm here to prove it" says the lead prosecutor. She claims together with prosecutor Stixrud that Hitler must be proven guilty.





Nearing the end of April, we were given a project that revolved around sustainability. This was about following a project from its production phase, all the way to the consumer phase. We chose to visit Stavern Blomstermakeri where they gave us an insight into the chosen project.

Stavern Blomstermakeri sells a variety of roses which sounded practical for us to choose. We managed to do an interview with one of the co-owners, Cecilie Lundberg. She first and foremost explained that having different roses can be a challenge. Since Norway introduced high custom duties, it has

made it difficult to have many varieties within the rose industry. An example she gave us was roses from The Netherlands not being imported to Norway because of custom duties. They have the power to prevent sales from those companies. Another thing she mentioned was "fairtrade roses". Fairtrade roses are roses that do not require customs duties, something that is quite beneficial in every way. People call it fairtrade because the producer is well paid while the buyer pays a decent price. Sustainability is crucial here, as this deal shortens the rose's processing time. Waste is also a factor that the flower shop highly prioritizes. A product gets utilized as much as possible so that too much waste is avoided. When it comes to fresh produce, it involves treating it the right way.

From visiting Stavern Blomstermakeri, we got a different aspect of how a product can be treated. In this case, there are many roses that go through a long production and transportation process without the producer receiving payment. However, solutions like "Fairtrade" help overcome such obstacles and hopefully create a sustainable environment. Thanks to Aud-Mari, Mari, Jane and Lars for a fun week 😂 💜












ERIK - 1IBA

Save the crying for after your done with the test, it only drains you of energy, which is better used studying.


Pray



ARE WE AT WAR?

he past two years have seen developments for the worse in several conflicts. Ukraine-Russia (Begun February 20th 2014. Escalated February 24th 2022). Palestine-Israel (7th October 2023). Kosovo v Serbia and their registration plates (31st July 2022 – 1st January 2024). Sudan (2023). Haiti (2023 & 2024, gang war). On top of all that, regional war almost broke out in the Middle East, thanks to Israel and Iran in mid-April 2024... What about the wannabe peace protectors Norway though?

The short answer is yes, Norway is also technically at war.

The longer answer however is... yes, Norway is also technically at war, but we are not directly involved with our own equipment. Norway contributes in some foreign operations, providing staffing mostly at headquarters. Additionally, as years have gone by, the emergence of the cyber domain (digital world basically) has provided state actors (organisations/groups that act on behalf of a nation/state) with a valuable way of finding important information. Even more scary, Norway is one of the most digitised nations in Europe (DESI 2022). Thus, services of everyday importance could be accessed and shut down by our potential adversaries in the case of war. Well, we don't need war to be attacked, as our adversaries want to map out our weaknesses before they attack us... That might explain why Norway has one major/significant cyber-attack hitting us each week (*Norge bak fasaden – Spiontrusselen*, 14:33-14:45).

In addition to what we may wish to call 'cyber-warfare', Norway is also contributing with a solid amount of both money and weapons to Ukraine's war effort. For example, Norway has given some state-of-the-art NASAMs air defence systems, money, artillery shells and soon also relatively modern F-16 fighter jets. Is international assistance participation in a war? Arguably not in the context of Norway's assistance to Ukraine. However, where does the boundary between war-funding and war participation meet? It could indeed be argued that Norway is one of many nations helping fund the war effort in Ukraine, but at what point does Norway go from funding to participating? Does a nation need to physically have soldiers fighting to be a participant in a war (outside the cyber domain)?

UNSETTLED LIVES

HIND'S HALL

n April 30th 2024, the student protesters at Columbia university renamed Hamilton hall "Hind's Hall". This display came after two weeks of the Gaza Solidarity encampment, an act of protest by the students to demand the University divest from Israel. Since october 7th, students from all over the world have gathered in protest of the genocide on Gaza, but the solidarity encampment at Columbia and Hind's Hall have gained massive media coverage in the last month, truly showing the magnitude of the disdain for Israel actions. In this short text, instead of writing a general article about the genocide in Gaza, I'd like to shine light on the story behind Hind's Hall and the impact student protesting has.

On January 29th 2024, the Palestinian rescue services (PRCS) received a call from 6 year old Hind Rajab. Hind had been in a car with her family when an Israeli tank had opened fire. On the call, which lasted several hours, it was revealed that Hind had been the sole survivor and was stranded inside the car with her deceased family. On February 10th, almost two weeks later, Hind and her family were found dead, with their car riddled with bullets. The story of Hind Rajab, who was only 6 years old, sparked public outrage and inspired the renaming of Hamilton's Hall to "Hind's Hall" 2 months later. This act of protest and solidarity was so powerful, that it reached all corners of the world, even to Gaza and to Hind's mother.

Recently, another tribute to Hind was made, but this time through a song; "Hind's Hall" by Macklemore. And while the song is a tribute to Hind and the people of Gaza, it also encourages and celebrates the student protests as well as the engagement of people from all over the world on social media. "Hind's Hall" reflects the outrage caused by 6-year-old Hind's murder and demonstrates the important part that students play in the protests. I think this is something that we, as high school students and future university students, have to be aware of. We have to be aware of the impact that we have on the world. We are the "leader's of tomorrow" and we have the power to make change. Just look at the Columbia University students; young people who have stood their ground and have made a change so big, it has reached people all over the world. Their activism and protesting in the name of 6-year-old Hind Rajab should stand as a lesson to what people can achieve, what WE can achieve, when fighting for our beliefs.


HVORDAN ENDTE DERE OPP MED Å JOBBE MED IB?

ERLING: Og i tillegg så er det jo teknologien, som er veldig, jeg skulle nesten si ekstremt—da vi begynte å undervise på åttitallet var det ingen mobiltelefoner, ingen pc-er. I dagliglivet betalte man jo med kontanter, ikke med kort. Før så var det mye tavle og kritt rett og slett. Man ser jo det med hvordan folk sitter med mobilen både i timer og i frikvarteret. Det fantes jo ikke da vi begynte. Det har også blitt mer vanlig at elever jobber utenfor skolen. Ungdommer har jo nå et større pengeforbruk, og før var det rett og slett ikke så vanlig å jobbe i tillegg til skolen.

NÅR DET GJELDER TEKNOLOGIEN SOM DU SIER – TENKER DERE DET HAR VÆRT EN HOVEDSAKELIG POSITIV ENDRING, ELLER SER DERE DET SOM NEGATIVT PÅ NOEN MÅTER? BØR VI KANSKJE KVITTE OSS MED DATAMASKINENE I SKOLEN?

ERLING OG TORE: På ingen måte.

TORE: Nei, det er klart at hvis man tar et fag som matematikk, så har det blitt et veldig annerledes fag enn da vi begynte å undervise. Man har jo Geogebra og CAS og programmering som deler av faget. Jeg tror egentlig ikke det bare er gevinster. De melder vel egentlig det i høyskoler og universiteter, at dem de får inn er dårligere i algebra enn før—og det er nok på grunn av at mye løses i CAS; Man slipper å regne for hånd, slipper algebraiske omformuleringer og slikt. Og sånn er det vel hele veien. Det er både gevinster, men også roller hvor det passer seg. Man har jo måtte se hele veien på teknologien: Hvor passer det inn? Teknologien kommer først, og så må man se hva den kan brukes til. Det har kanskje vært en noe for stor iver på det, men det er jo sånn at bruken av teknologi i de tusen hjem er mye mer utbredt nå. Og den ene følger nok den andre der. Man bruker det hemme, så det

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blir en selvfølge at man bruker det i skolen også.

ERLING: Jeg er veldig enig. Og i tillegg så merker jeg at når jeg skal undervise så har jeg en større verktøykasse enn jeg har hatt tidligere når det gjelder undervisning. Som jeg sa så pleide det jo å være mye tavle og kritt, og hvis man går langt nok tilbake så var det faktisk ikke så veldig mye mer. Nå kan jeg finne ressurser på nettet som jeg kan ta med i undervisning, for eksempel animasjoner som jeg kan bruke. Man har rett og slett helt andre muligheter i dag.

TORE (ler): Selvsagt.

TORE: Jeg antar at de også la merke til blikket mitt. (alle ler).

HVA, ELLER KANSKJE HVEM, TROR DERE DERE KOMMER TIL Å SAVNE MEST FRA SVGS?

ERLING: Det har jeg ikke tenkt så mye på: Det blir jo rart å levere nøkkelen og forlate kontorplassen sin, også skal noen andre flytte in det—Ja, det jeg skal savne mest er nok det kollegiale.

TORE: Altså, elever er det jo nye av hele tida, men en savner jo også den kontakten med elever også—eller jeg tror i hvert fall jeg vil gjøre det. Det er jo ikke bestandig at den kontakten er den beste. Noen elevgrupper er litt vanskelige.

ERLING: Også er det jo noen veldig hyggelige kolleger, så det er klart at det å komme her på morgenen og treffe kolleger og gå til undervisning, det er trivelig det.

ER DET NOE DERE TROR DERE IKKE KOMMER TIL Å SAVNE?

ERLING: Å ja—Samme som dere når dere er ferdig. (alle ler).

TORE: Vi kan sette opp en liste i alfabetisk rekkefølge. (alle ler). Karaktermøtet kommer jeg definitivt ikke til å savne. Det synes jeg er—ja, det er noe for seg selv. The airport worker's voice was emotionless, a bit weary from working at 4 am. In contrast, my hands, trembling slightly with excitement, accepted the turquoise passport

with a golden frame. I turned around one last time, catching so beloved, yet more nervous than mine, the gaze of my parents, before the door to the departure lounge separated us for long months.

Complete darkness. The cacophony of sounds that a person could make in their sleep was no longer irritating. Only my numb lower back would sometimes make me distract myself and return my detached gaze to the ceiling of the plane to reality.

"Damn it, I won't fall asleep," I thought to myself, resigned. My hand was already rummaging in my jeans pocket to get my headphones.

Bam!

The sound of something falling, which seemed unnaturally loud at the time, broke through the snoring odes. A second later, I was already squatting on the floor with a flashlight on and a face burning with shame, trying to find my headphone case. Some kind neighbour from the next row handed me my right earbud. Of course, the case opened, what did I expect?

The level of awkwardness grew exponentially with each second, I studied the bottom of the plane in search of the

left earbud. At least I didn't have "leg day" the day before...

When the absurdity of the whole situation finally dawned on me, I had to get up from the bottom, for once in my life, and ask for help. I never thought my first English practice outside of school would be with a German stewardess. We have a saying: "The first pancake is lumpy." I leave my conversational English to your imagination, as the poor German woman had to ask other passengers for help communicating with me.

My first independent flight in my life.

September 19, 2022. Bright memory to the left Samsung Galaxy Bud.

The wind of Frankfurt, as if mocking me on purpose, irritated my bare left ear. The third week of the cold German September insistently demonstrated how warm, in all senses, home was left behind by the 5-hour flight. Shivers, whether from resentment for the earbud or from the frosty morning, pierced me from head to toe. Arrival from a country outside the European Union was inevitably accompanied by an endless queue of the same "lucky" people - representatives of the other 5 continents.

Americans who were too optimistic for such an early morning and a long queue immediately caught my eye, or rather, my ear (well, just the left part of it).

But even such practice in listening did not save the next Germans from my poor English. You can't create a more caricature situation: a German border guard - a blonde with blue eyes, stops me - an Asian woman with dark eyes and hair, at passport control. My Russian accent and his German one clashed in a verbal battle, leaving us both confused.

"What does a 7-day visa mean? I'm going to study at school for at least a year. I flew specially to Moscow to the Norwegian embassy for this visa, it should be correct," I addressed the equally bewildered German border guard with a voice tired from a sleepless night and tense from growing anxiety.

The agitated German speech of the airport worker, contacting someone on the phone for help, triggered me then probably as much as my grandfather did back in the Soviet Union.

And here she appears - my guardian angel, another employee, who speaks Russian and German. Thanks to her help, an important detail - my planned meeting with the Norwegian police, was considered, and the German part of my journey was finally lit up after a long darkness.

Norway, against the backdrop of harsh Germany, seemed like a long-awaited salvation. Unlike the morning, the cool breeze of the evening in Oslo did not burn at all.

2 suitcases of 23 kg each, a ticket in hand for one adult for 400NOK from Oslo to Sandefjord, although I was 17, and all the same bare left ear - but all this was so unimportant, so insignificant. I was on the verge of a completely new life, my reality turned upside down in one day (just like my case), and I was completely alone on this path.







RULE:








support and motivate us and ensure that the exam period was as painless as possible (if that is possible after those papers).
